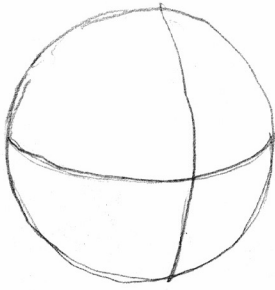
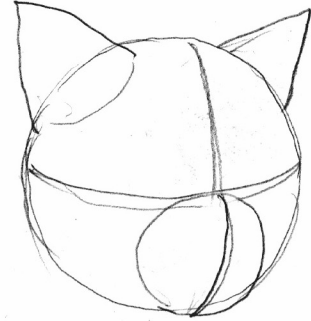


How to Draw Graystripe

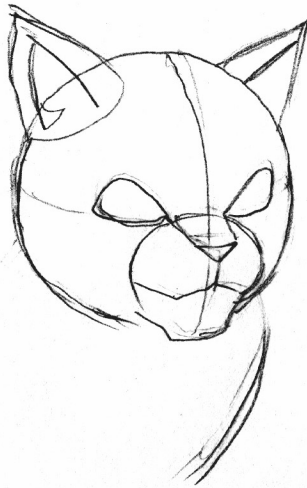

1. Draw a circle for the head.
2. Imagine the circle is a round ball and draw lines "around it". The lines should meet in the direction he faces.



3. Add a smaller circle for the snout. Half of this "ball" shape extends from the bigger one.



4. Add cone shapes for the ears and place the eyes on either side of the snout.
5. Lines extend forward from the corners of the eyes and go to the nose.
6. Imagine the shape of the mouth and chin. Define those details using the "ball shape" as a base.



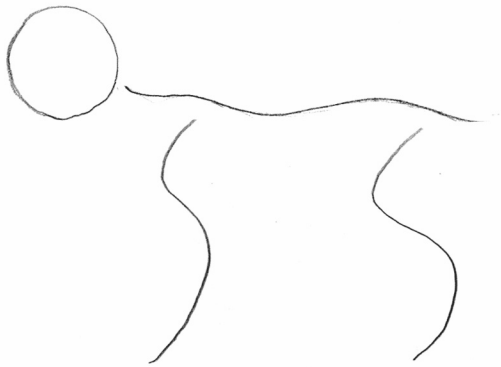
7. Graystripe is a long haired Warrior cat. He has a spiky tuft of hair on his head and bushy eyebrows.
8. He also has a hairy face- more hair spurts out of his "cheeks".
9. These details make Graystripe unique and easily recognizable.

10. Add your details with a pen and erase the pencils.
11. Notice the shaded area beneath his eyes. He's been through a lot and it shows!
12. Small, dashed lines are good for indicating the curves of his face and fur.

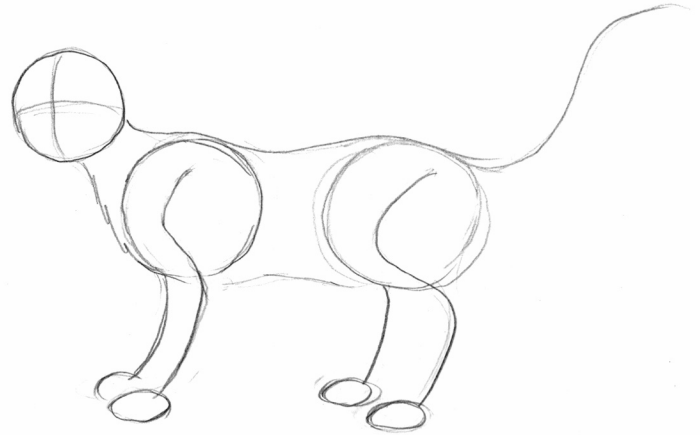


How to Draw a Cat

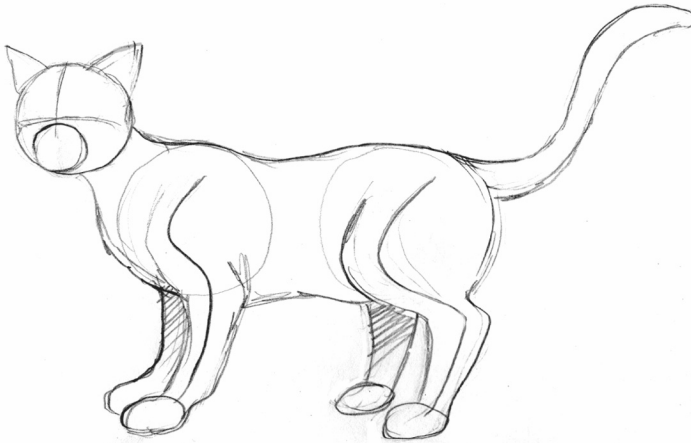

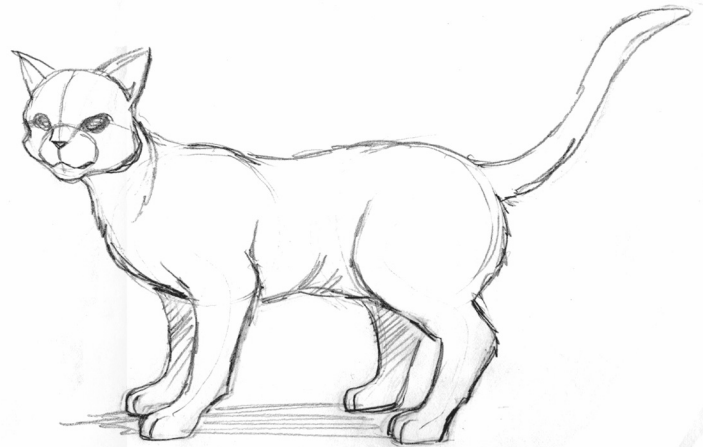
1. Draw a circle for the head.
2. Use a slight "S" curve for the spine and then a more defined "S" curve for the legs
3. The body is between 4 and 5 "heads" long.



4. Use bigger circles to fill out the chest and hips.
5. Add the legs on the far side and place ovals for the feet.
6. Attach the tail to the spine.
7. Decide where you want the face to be and start sketching the horizontal and vertical lines.

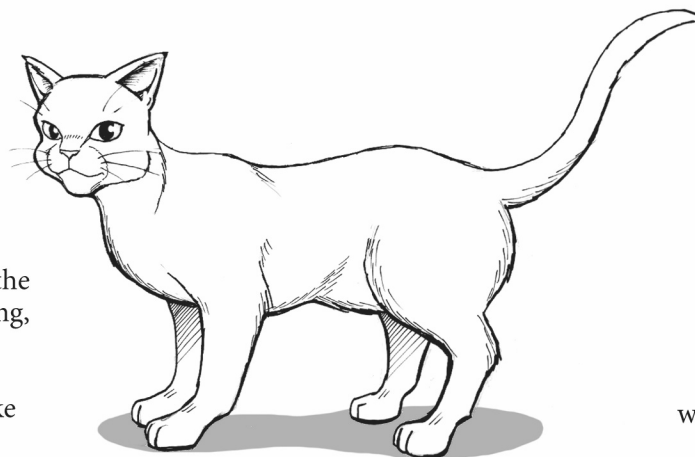


8. Define the chest, stomach and tail. Imagine muscles around the other shapes.
9. Fill out the legs- remember the "S" curve underneath.
10. Draw a smaller circle for the snout and cone shapes for the ears.



11. Continue the face. Remember the nose extends forward from the vertical line of the head.
12. Add shading and fur.

13. You can add your details with a pen. Use thicker lines for the fur around the body and thinner lines for the shading, then erase the pencil.
14. Don't forget the whiskers!
15. Choose stripes, spots or color to make it look like your favorite cat.



How to Draw a Cat Sitting

1. Draw a circle for the head.
2. The spine is turned slightly toward us so the "S" looks less curvy.
3. The front legs are extended and the back legs are squashed.
3. The body is between 3 and 4 "heads" tall when sitting.



4. Add bigger circles to fill out the chest and hips.
5. Both of the front legs are visible.
6. Attach the tail to the spine.
7. Sketch the horizontal and vertical lines for the face.



8. The chest is puffed out, the stomach is squashed, and the tail can curve around the feet.
9. Fill out the legs- remember the "S" curve underneath.
10. Draw a smaller circle for the snout and cone shapes for the ears.



11. Continue the face. There are lines that extend from the inside corner of the eyes to the nose.
12. Add shading and fur.



13. You can add your details with a pen. Use thicker lines for the fur around the body and thinner lines for the shading, then erase the pencil.
14. Choose stripes, spots or color to make it look like your favorite cat.
